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Mucinex is the old drug guaifenesin in a new FDAapproved OTC extended-release formulation. In recommended dosages, it is generally regarded as safe. Medical Letter consultants have not been impressed by guaifenesin's effectiveness in older formulations.

IN BRIEF: Mucinex

Patients may be asking health care providers about the safety and effectiveness of *Mucinex* (Adams), which is being heavily advertised on television and elsewhere for treatment of respiratory congestion. These ads suggest that *Mucinex* is a new drug, when actually it is an extended-release formulation of guaifenesin, an old expectorant. Guaifenesin increases the volume of secretions in the respiratory tract, which facilitates removal of viscous mucus by coughing. Medical Letter consultants have not been impressed by its effectiveness. Guaifenesin is in the category of drugs "Generally Recognized as Safe" (GRAS) and is included in many prescription and over-the-counter cough remedies,¹ but the manufacturer of *Mucinex* nevertheless sought and received FDA approval. Now the FDA has removed all single-ingredient extended-release guaifenesin products from the market until the manufacturers also apply for and receive approval. *Mucinex* is available without a prescription for patients 12 years or older and is taken every 12 hours. A bottle of 20 600-mg tablets costs about \$12 at a local chain pharmacy. □
